Many families, seniors, and individuals in our community relied on BVO to make their lives better - and we continued to deliver!

Caring for Our Children

60 Children from 59 families were cared for at BVO Preschool

125 Children from 97 families spent quality time together at our EarlyON Child & Family Centre

50 Children enjoyed after-school activities at Kids Club

14,970 Breakfasts were served at Beaver Valley Community School. Over 1,070 volunteer hours

103 Children from 80 families participated in Summer Fun Day Camp

27 Children from 17 households received Recreational Funding

75 students participated in Exam De-stress Events; numerous visits to weekly table at GBCS

Keeping Seniors Safe & Engaged

306 Sessions of Seniors Centre Without Walls; approx. 75 individuals, seniors, family & caregivers served, with 55 people attending multiple sessions

5 Live seminars & 27 phone sessions on Seniors' Rights, Finances, Housing & Preventing Abuse of Older Adults

75 Seniors & households benefited from individual advocacy

36 Average number of households BVO supported per month with food & gift cards

110 Households supported through our Holiday Hamper program

585 lbs Of fresh, local food was donated to BVO's Food Cubby from Thornbury Community Gardens; 24 plots rented; 2 plots allotted to BVO

48 Boxes of fruits & vegetables for our Good Food Box buying cooperative (many of these subsidized) over 10 months

Program; \$29,400 generated to support
